



Instructions for Authors

Scope

The *European Journal of Health Law (EJHL)* focuses on the development of health law in Europe: national, comparative and international. The exchange of views between health lawyers in Europe is encouraged. The Journal publishes information on the activities of European and other international organisations in the field of health law. Discussions about ethical questions with legal implications are welcome. National legislation, court decisions and other relevant national material with international implications are also dealt with. Each issue of the *European Journal of Health Law* contains articles (with abstracts), selected legislation, judicial decisions, a chronicle of events, and book reviews.

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Submission Requirements

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Manuscripts should be written in British English, using UK spelling and grammar (ise not ize, co-ordinate). Spelling should be consistent throughout. As the journal does not make use of a copy editor, authors whose mother tongue is not English, are strongly urged to have a native speaker check over their manuscript prior to submission. Single quotation marks, but double if a quote within a quote.

Types of Contributions

The journal accepts articles in the following categories:

- Articles;
- News & Views;
- Selected Legislation and Jurisprudence;
- Book Reviews.

Length

The length for manuscripts submitted should be:

- Articles: 5800-9500 words including footnotes;
- News and Views: 3800-7600 words including footnotes;
- Book Reviews: 1140 -2660 words including footnotes.

Manuscript Structure

General

All submissions should be single spaced (12-pt font) pages, including abstract, keywords, tables, figures, notes and appendices. The text file should be typed as flat text, with as little formatting as possible and paginated throughout. The first page of the manuscript should include: manuscript title, name and affiliations of all authors, abstract and keywords (articles or news & views), the body of the manuscript. Footnotes should be 10 pt.

Abstract and Keywords

All articles or news & views should have an abstract of 150 words or less, and 3-8 keywords.

Punctuation

Type one space only after full stops; one space after other punctuation marks where grammatically appropriate is sufficient.



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Headings

The numbering style for headings is as follows:

1, 1.1, 1.1.1

First level heading: 2 white lines of space above the heading, and one below it.

1 Introduction

The text.

1.1 *The Second Level Is Bold Italics*

1.1.1 The Third Level Is Roman

Block Quotations

Quotations of three lines or more are typed as block quotations, indented and set off from the body text by one white line of space above and below it. The text should be the same size as the body text. These block quotes do not take quotation marks.

Style Elements

Certain basic elements of style should be consistent throughout. Always use the spelling checker and search function to ensure that spelling is correct and consequent, such as:

Article 17, Art. 3, Article, paragraphs, section spelled out in text, abbreviated in parenthesis and footnotes

Case v. Case

Currency: e.g., USD, AD, UKP

Dates: e.g., 1 November 2021; years: 1985-1989 (not: 1985-89)

i.e., e.g., etc.

Member States (of the EU)

Numbers: 10 (figures in numerals); 121-122 (not: 121-22); 0-39; 21st century

Para. 7; paras. 7-9

Per cent (% in tables)

Titles, e.g., Mr. or Mr

Section 4

The Times, the Independent (and other newspapers)

USA, EC, OECD



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References

This journal uses footnotes and not endnotes. Bibliographic information in the footnotes should be as complete as possible. The first time information should be given in full, and thereafter *ibid.* (if the reference is the same) or *supra* note x (if referred to above) should be used.

Footnote numbers should be placed after punctuation marks (,¹; ¹; ¹¹)

Citation of Cases

Citations of cases should follow the style of the country of origin, including the date of the case, except for cases from common-law jurisdictions. The name of the jurisdictions and of the review or law report in which the case is published should be included. The names of the parties in cases from common-law jurisdictions should be in italics. The abbreviation 'v.' (for versus) should be in roman:

Figure Files

All figures and tables must be cited consecutively in the text. Figures should be submitted as separate source files in .eps, .tif, or .jpg format, in a size suitable for the typesetting area of the journal which is 11.5 cm x 18 cm. The resolution of these files should be at least 300 dpi for half-tone figures, and 600 dpi for line drawings. Number the files, and indicate in the manuscript where they are to appear (Fig. 1 here). The text in a figure must be legible, and should not be smaller than corps 7. The size of this lettering for any text in a figure should be the same for all figures in the manuscript.

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
