



Instructions for Authors

Scope

Grazer Philosophische Studien - International Journal for Analytic Philosophy (GPS) is a peer reviewed journal that publishes articles on philosophical problems in every area, especially articles related to the analytic tradition. Each year at least two volumes are published, including special issues with invited papers. Reviews are accepted by invitation only. *Grazer Philosophische Studien* has been published as a [book series](#) until the end of 2015. The *Grazer Philosophische Studien* will be published as a [journal](#) as of 2016. All back volumes are still available.

Ethical and Legal Conditions

The publication of a manuscript in a peer-reviewed work is expected to follow standards of ethical behavior for all parties involved in the act of publishing: authors, editors, and reviewers. Authors, editors, and reviewers should thoroughly acquaint themselves with Brill's publication ethics, which may be downloaded here: brill.com/page/ethics/publication-ethics-cope-compliance.

Submission

Authors may submit up to two papers to *GPS* per year. Submission of a manuscript implies consent to the ethical and legal conditions specified above, in particular that the work submitted has not been published before and that the manuscript is not under consideration for publication anywhere else. Manuscripts should be prepared for submission according to the submission requirements specified below.

Triple-blind Peer Review

All papers submitted to *GPS* are reviewed by one of the Editors, and papers judged to be sufficiently in accord with *GPS*'s scope and quality standards are also reviewed by external referees. In respect of these referees, *GPS* uses a triple-blind peer review system, which means the manuscript author(s) do not know who the reviewers are, and the reviewers and editors do not know the names of the author(s). When you submit your article please submit a separate title page which includes the full title of the manuscript plus the names and complete contact details of all authors. This page will be accessible to the managing editor only, who is never involved in the reviewing process. All other files (manuscript, figures, tables, etc.) should not contain any information that would identify the author. The names of these files and the document properties should also be anonymized.

File Formats

Manuscripts for *GPS* can be submitted in the usual editable formats including .doc, .odt, LaTeX, and rtf, but not as a pdf file.

Submission Requirements

Language

GPS articles are published in English or German. Submissions of non-native English (German) speakers must be in clear grammatical English (German), and the assistance of a native English (German) writer is recommended.

Unicode Fonts and Non-Roman Scripts

Texts should employ Unicode fonts as far as possible. If your article contains non-Roman scripts (such as Greek) or logical formulas and mathematical characters please also submit a pdf file in which all non-Roman characters are displayed correctly. All fonts must be embedded.

Manuscript Structure

Eliminate any section or page breaks, and eliminate any headers or footers. The article should be paginated in the lower right corner. Set off quotations in block quote with a blank line before and after the quotation. Footnotes are placed at the bottom of pages. A references list, listing all materials cited in the paper and footnotes must conclude the paper.

Abstract and Keywords

The article title, an abstract of 100-150 words, and 2-6 keywords begin the submission.

Headings

The article should use internal sections. Only use 1, 2, 3, etc. for internal sections, in bold font. You may add section titles like this: **3 Truth and Indefeasibility**

Figures and Tables

Illustrations, tables, and figures must be numbered consecutively (e.g., FIGURE 1, FIGURE 2, etc.) and include captions to give a description and to identify the source of any image or data. All figures and tables must be cited consecutively in the text. Figures should be submitted as separate source files in .png, .tif, or .jpg format, in a size suitable for the typesetting area of the journal. The resolution of these files should be at least 600 dpi. Number the files and indicate in the manuscript where they are to appear, like this: (Fig. 1 here). The text in a figure must be legible, and should not be smaller than font size 9. The size of this lettering for any text in a figure should be the same for all figures in the manuscript. Authors are responsible for obtaining and paying for all copyright and reproduction charges.

Footnotes

Footnotes should be numbered consecutively as 1, 2, 3, etc. in Arabic numerals. The auto-formatting of footnotes is required for accepted papers. Your footnotes should be brief. Extended commentary or parenthetical discussions are important enough to remain within the main body of the paper.

Superscript numbers marking footnotes should follow immediately after the punctuation or the quotation. The footnotes should be numbered consecutively and placed at the bottom of each page. No asterisks or roman numerals should be used anywhere.

GPS does not permit a footnote to the article title or the abstract. It also does not permit a footnote to the first or last sentences of your article to thank people, or make remarks about the origins of the paper. Instead, compose a separate Acknowledgements section that goes at the end of the article, before the References.

Use en-dash <cntrl><-> – for pagination and include all page numbers: pp. 234–237, not p. 234-7.

Use *Ibid.* where useful. Do not use abbreviations such as *cf.* or *ff.* or *op. cit.*

Citations

In-Text Citations

Do not use footnotes for citations. Use in-text citations, following either the *Chicago Manual of Style* or the examples provided below:

(Burge 1979, 12)

(Burge 1979, 1982, 1986)

(Burge 1979, Putnam 1975)

(Putnam 1975, 34; Burge 1979, 12)

References in the Text

References in the text follow the style for citations. However, reference elements that already occur within the running text should be left outside of the enclosing parentheses, following the examples provided below:

“As Smith says, ‘...’ (2000, 25).

“Smith has long advocated for this position, beginning in 2000.

Reference List

In compiling the reference list, consistently apply one style, preferably the *Chicago Manual of Style*, or follow the examples below.

Book Chapter in Anthologies

Last Name, First Name Year. "Title." In: *Title of the Book (in italics)*. Edited by First Name Last Name, Place of Publication: Publisher, pages.

Lackey, Jennifer 2006b. “It Takes Two to Tango: Beyond Reductionism and Non-Reductionism in the Epistemology of Testimony.” In: *The Epistemology of Testimony*, edited by Jennifer Lackey & Ernest Sosa, Oxford: Oxford University Press, 160-189.

Book Monographs

Last Name, First Name Year. *Title (in italics)*. Place of Publication: Publisher.

Brown, Jessica 2004. *Anti-Individualism and Knowledge*. Cambridge, Mass.-London: MIT Press.

Journal Article

Last Name, First Name Year. "Title." *Journal (in italics)* volume, pages.

Bilgrami, Akeel 1993. “Can Externalism Be Reconciled with Self-knowledge?” *Philosophical Topics* 20, 233-267.

If a DOI number is known, please add it.

Italics

Do not use **bold** in the text except for section headings; use *italics* instead. Keep its use to a minimum.

Publication

Proofs

Upon acceptance, a PDF of the article proofs will be sent to each author by e-mail to check carefully for factual and typographic errors. Authors are responsible for checking these proofs and are strongly urged to make use of the Comment & Markup toolbar to note their corrections directly on the proofs. At this stage in the production process only minor corrections are allowed. Alterations to the original manuscript at this stage will result in considerable delay in publication and, therefore, are not accepted unless charged to the author. Proofs should be returned within 7 days of receipt.

E-offprints

A PDF file of the article will be supplied free of charge by the publisher to authors for personal use. Brill is a RoMEO yellow publisher. The Author retains the right to self-archive the submitted (pre-peer-review) version of the article at any time. The submitted version of an article is the author's version that has not been peer-reviewed, nor had any value added to it by Brill (such as formatting or copy editing). The Author retains the right to self-archive the accepted (peer-reviewed) version without any embargo period. The accepted version means the version which has been accepted for publication and contains all revisions made after peer reviewing and copy editing, but has not yet been typeset in the publisher's lay-out. The publisher's lay-out must not be used in any repository or on any website (brill.com/resources/authors/publishing-books-brill/self-archiving-rights).

License to Publish

Copyright and License to Publish

By submitting a manuscript, the author warrants and represents that they are the sole author and owner of the Contribution and the copyright thereof, and will grant Brill the exclusive and irrevocable license to publish their contribution by signing a License to Publish form.

Open Access

Should the author wish to publish the article in Open Access he/she can choose the Brill Open option. This allows for non-exclusive Open Access publication under a Creative Commons license in exchange for an Article Publication Charge (APC), upon signing a special Brill Open Consent to Publish Form.
