## *Instructions for Authors*

## Scope

The Journal of Greek Linguistics (JGL) is an established (double-anonymous) peer-reviewed international journal dedicated to the descriptive and theoretical study of the Greek language from its roots in Ancient Greek down to present-day dialects and varieties, including those spoken in Asia Minor, Cyprus, Tsakonia, and the Greek diaspora. It aims to offer a focused outlet for publication of first-class research in Greek Linguistics, broadly construed. JGL's goal is not only to reach linguists interested in the Greek language but also to engage the linguistics community and Hellenists more generally. The input to JGL will thus comprise any topic relevant to Greek linguistics, in the broadest sense, but with some preference given to material with wider relevance to specific subfields within linguistics proper. The intention is therefore on the one hand to encourage discussions and research that illuminate different aspects - theoretical, historical, and descriptive - of general linguistics using Greek data, and on the other hand to offer innovative solutions to problems and issues specific to the description and analysis of the Greek language. Greek has played a central role in linguistics and the study of language for centuries. JGL will bring the language into a key position in current debate within Linguistics and related fields.

## **Open Access**

The *Journal of Greek Linguistics* is a fully Open Access journal, which means that all content will be freely accessible online. All articles are published under a non-exclusive Open Access license in exchange for an Article Publication Charge (APC) which needs to be met by the authors or their research funders. Full waivers are offered only to authors residing in Greece and affiliated with a Greek institution. ### Double-anonymous Peer Review

All submitted papers will be subject to double-anonymous peer review. For the purpose of reviewing the draft paper should be anonymous. No author details should be identifiable from the article itself or in the acknowledgements. When you submit your article via Editorial Manager, you will be asked to submit a separate title page that includes the full title of the manuscript, the names and complete contact details of all authors, the abstract, keywords, and any acknowledgement texts.

# **Submission Requirements**

### Language

Articles and book reviews should be written in English. Spelling (British or American) should be consistent throughout.

#### Unicode and Non-Roman Fonts

The Editors request the use of Unicode-friendly fonts only. Updated versions of Times New Roman in Microsoft Windows contain Greek Unicode fonts. ### *Transliteration and Orthography*

Where possible, all examples from languages not using the Latin alphabet should be transliterated using an accepted system of transliteration. Authors should use their chosen system consistently throughout the manuscript.

Where no standard system has been adopted in the literature (e.g. examples of certain dialects never described before), use symbols to represent sounds that are as close to the IPA symbols as possible, and give explanations where appropriate.

Where a transliteration system is already used in the literature, no new transliteration system invented by the author will be accepted. ## *Instructions for Authors*

### Length

Articles should not exceed 10.000 words (general and research articles) or 1500-3000 words for book reviews. The following should be included: abstract (100 to 150 words), up to six keywords, affiliation details and e-mail address.

## **Manuscript Structure**

#### General

Papers that are submitted for initial consideration should be complete, including all notes, bibliographical references, tables, etc.

The journal reserves the right to copy-edit contributions to conform to its style.

Authors should not use desktop publishing features such as justification, centering, or bold-face type. Italics should be indicated by using proper italics. Do not hyphenate words at the end of a line. TAB should be restricted to a paragraph indent.

For general rules on style, see the *Chicago Manual of Style*, 16th ed., University of Chicago Press, 2010 (<a href="mailto:chicagomanualofstyle.org/home.html">chicagomanualofstyle.org/home.html</a>), or the most recent edition) or the *MLA Style Guide*. The final draft of a manuscript accepted for publication must be submitted both as hard copy and electronically. Electronic files should be saved in .pdf format. Final versions and printouts must be proofread carefully before submission; please use your spelling and grammar check.

#### **Abstracts**

Articles should include a short abstract (150 words).

### Keywords

Please supply 2-6 keywords (in lowercase letters), to be placed below the abstract, for indexing purposes.

#### Glosses

### **Proofs**

Upon acceptance, a PDF of the article proofs will be sent to the author by e-mail to check carefully for factual and typographic errors. In the event of a multi-authored contribution, proofs are sent to the first-named author unless otherwise requested. Authors are responsible for checking these proofs and are strongly urged to make use of the Comment & Markup toolbar to note their corrections directly on the proofs. At this stage in the production process only minor corrections are allowed. Alterations to the original manuscript at this stage will result in considerable delay in publication and, therefore, are not accepted unless charged to the author. Proofs should be returned promptly.
