



### *Instructions for Authors*

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## Scope

*The Law and Practice of International Courts and Tribunals (LAPE)* is firmly established as the leading journal in its field. It aims to provide the reader with articles and information on current activities of international courts and tribunals with a particular emphasis on procedural questions. Each issue will give you the latest developments with respect to the preparation, adoption, suspension, amendment and revision of Rules of Procedure as well as statutory and internal rules and other related matters. The *Journal* will also provide you with the latest practice with respect to the interpretation and application of rules of procedure and constitutional documents, which can be found in judgments, advisory opinions, written and oral pleadings as well as legal literature.

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## Submission Requirements

#### *Language*

Articles are published in English. British English spelling should be used. The preferred reference source is the *Oxford English Dictionary*.

#### *Length*

The journal publishes articles, short 'Current Developments' pieces, and book reviews. The recommended length (including footnotes) is 7000 to 12000 words for articles, 4000–6000 words for 'Current Developments' pieces, and 2000 words for book reviews.

## Manuscript Structure

Articles must be typed, double-spaced throughout, allowing good margins.

#### *Abstract and Keywords*

An abstract of 100-150 words should be submitted, together with 3-8 keywords.

#### *Headings*

Headings should be flush left and follow the following format:

This journal uses footnotes and not endnotes or a reference list. Footnotes should be kept to a minimum and references within them should follow the styles as given below. The first time a reference is given, provide it as completely as possible. Thereafter use *Ibid.* for a second footnote identical to the one above. If the reference is the same, but the pagination different, then use: *Ibid.*, p. x. For a reference to an earlier footnote use: *Supra* note x, at XX.

Case names should be in italics and cases should be cited following the format recommended by the relevant court or tribunal. For example, an ICJ case should be cited as follows:

*Kasikili/Sedudu Island (Botswana/Namibia), Judgment, I.C.J. Reports 1999, p. 1045.*

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
