## Call for Papers for a Special Issue on the topic: **Exploring Global Populisms** (Spring 2019) Co-editors: **Amy Skonieczny** and **Amentahru Wahlrab**

We are witnessing the growing global appeal of political populisms—particularly in regions that were ardent supporters of globalization. Indeed, populism's rejection of 'globalism' and its worldwide geographical reach are two defining features that make it a truly 'global' phenomenon. While there has been a recent explosion of research in the area of populism, particularly right-wing populism in Europe, this call for papers seeks to address rising populist movements as a reaction to perceived consequences of globalization as a global phenomenon. Moreover, it seeks to address the current and future consequences of a 'populist' future for human rights, democratic institutions, and the global economy.

This special issue on *Exploring Global Populisms* invites papers that address the transnational, cross-border features of populism from multiple dimensions and that engage both theoretically and empirically with a range of questions including but not limited to: 1) How can current and future directions in the study of global populisms help us understand our contentious political climate? 2) What is the significance of capitalism and the state in shaping global populisms in different social and geographical contexts? 3) How are the nationalist and nativist conceptions of identity prevalent in populist discourses challenging democratic practices and institutions? 4) How is populism manifesting in different locales as well as translating across borders? Ultimately, this special issue seeks to engage with and push forward the critical contributions of scholarship on populism in a globalized world.

We invite full manuscripts of 6,000-8,000 words that reflect new work on the topics above as well as manuscripts which engage with a groundbreaking article, special edition or recent symposium on the subject of global populism.

The following timeline will be followed for considering manuscripts:

August 1, 2018: Call for papers circulated

October 1, 2018: Full manuscripts (6,000-8,000 words) due for consideration

for double-blind peer review

October 15, 2018: Authors notified of decision to send out for double-blind

peer review or rejection

November 30, 2018: Comments from Editors and reviewers returned to authors

January 4, 2019: Deadline for revised manuscripts

January 15, 2019: Final decisions communicated to authors and manuscripts
