Launch of Brill's new content management tool – R Suite



We're delighted to announce that R Suite – Brill's new content management tool – has recently launched, to provide our authors with an even faster time from submission to publication.

Introduced in September for the production of journal articles, R Suite includes:

- Repository functionality
- Storage of different manuscript versions (including XML) throughout the various stages of production
- An automated workflow system
- Formatting of manuscripts using a MS Word-based template - allows us to produce a proof that authors can check for factual content, which is automatically forwarded to you via a built-in email system.

From Q4 2016, we will also begin using R Suite for the production of book and Brill Research Projects. Please contact your editor if you have any questions.

We believe that the publication culture in the Humanities and Social Sciences will be influenced by the addition of data, software, and expanded use of multi-media content; publications will have to comply with user


demands and FAIR principles (Findability, Accessibility, Interoperability, Reusability).

Brill is determined to play a leading role in publishing innovation across the fields in which we publish, and actively develop partnerships in pursuit of innovation.



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
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New €1,000 prize for early-career researchers
