A Canadian Rhodes Scholar and a Trudeau Scholar, she has worked with several international agencies and written on issues of global governance, Canada-U.S. relations, and environmental law.

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Chris Brown is Professor of International Relations at the London School of Economics. He is the author of numerous articles in international political theory and of *Practical Judgement in International Political Theory* (2010), *Sovereignty, Rights and Justice* (2002), *International Relations Theory: New Normative Approaches* (1992), editor of *Political Restructuring in Europe: Ethical Perspectives* (1994) and co-editor of *International Relations in Political Thought: Texts from the Greeks to the First World War* (2002). His textbook *Understanding International Relations* (4th ed. 2009) has been translated into Arabic, Turkish and Chinese.

Jutta Brunnée is a Professor of Law and holds the Metcalf Chair in Environmental Law in the Faculty of Law at the University of Toronto, where she teaches international law and international environmental law. She is a Co-Editor of the *Oxford Handbook of International Environmental Law* and serves on the Board of Editors of the *American Journal of International Law*.

Her current research interests include the international law on the use of force, the global climate change regime, compliance with international law, and international legal theory.

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Gareth Evans is Honorary Professorial Fellow at the University of Melbourne, Chancellor of Australian National University, President Emeritus of the International Crisis Group, and Co-Chair of the International Commission on Nuclear Non-Proliferation and Disarmament (www.icnnd.org). He previously spent 21 years in Australian politics, thirteen of them as a Cabinet Minister. As Foreign Minister (1988-96) he was best known internationally for his role in developing the UN peace plan for Cambodia, helping conclude the Chemical Weapons Convention, and helping initiate new Asia Pacific regional economic and security architecture. He has written or edited nine books – most recently *The Responsibility to Protect: Ending Mass Atrocity Crimes Once and for All*, 2008, paperback edition with new preface 2009 – and has published over 100 journal articles and chapters on foreign relations, human rights and legal and constitutional reform. He was Co-Chair of the International Commission on Intervention and State Sovereignty (2001), and a member of the UN Secretary General's High Level Panel on Threats, Challenges and Change (2004), the Blix Commission on Weapons of Mass Destruction (2006), the Zedillo Commission of Eminent Persons on The Role of the IAEA to 2020 and Beyond (2008) and the UN Secretary-General's Advisory Committee on Genocide Prevention. He is Co-Chair of the International Advisory Board of the Global Centre for the Responsibility to Protect.

Dorota Gierycz has had a long and distinguished career in international affairs, peacekeeping, conflict resolution and human rights. She worked at the United Nations, serving in senior positions at its headquarters both Vienna and New York and in numerous peace missions around the world, in Bosnia-Herzegovina (2001-2003), Georgia (2003-2004) and Liberia, as Director of the Human Rights and Protection Section (2004-2007). She has authored numerous academic articles, and regularly teaches and guest lectures worldwide. Since her departure from the UN in 2007, she has been working as a senior research fellow at the European Inter-University Centre for Human Rights and Democratization (EIUC, Venice) and Norwegian Institute of International Affairs (NUPI, Oslo). She is currently associated with Ludwig Boltzman Institute of Human Rights, University of Vienna, Austria. Dr. Dorota Gierycz holds an MA in law and a Ph.D. in political science.
