*Henrik Bull* graduated from the University of Oslo in 1984 after completing his studies in Russian language and literature and in law. He worked in the Department of Legislation of the Norwegian Ministry of Justice until 1996. From 1996 until 2001, he was a researcher at the Centre for European Law at the University of Oslo, where he did his doctorate in the free movement of financial services within the EU. From 2002 until 2006, he was an Associate Professor at the Faculty of Law in Oslo and Director of the Centre for European Law; there, he continued his research in EU law—mainly in the field of internal market law and private international law.

His most recent publications are articles dealing with the approach to European law in Norwegian legislation and Norwegian jurisprudence contained in Peter-Christian Müller-Graff and Erling Selvig (eds.), *The Approach to European Law in Germany and Norway* (BWV, Berlin, 2004), and revised commentaries to the Agreement on the European Economic Area and the Lugano Convention on jurisdiction and the enforcement of judgments in civil and commercial matters, as well as to several other treaties and acts, in *Norsk Lovkommentar* 2005.

Between 2001 and 2003, Judge Bull acted as a consultant to the Russian Ministry of Economic Development and Trade on reform of Russian foreign trade legislation.

As of 2006, Henrik Bull has been a judge at the EFTA Court in Luxembourg.

*Katarzyna Gromek-Broc* graduated with a Master's degree in law and administration from the University of Warsaw in 1986. Thereafter, she has focused her work (postgraduate studies) in EC law and (doctoral studies) in private international law.

From 1992-1998, she was a researcher at the European University Institute in Florence, where she was an assistant to Professor Snyder (in EU and international law). In 1998, she was awarded a PhD in EU Law; since then, Dr. Gromek-Broc has lectured at the University of Hull and the Law School (United Kingdom).

In addition, she has been a Visiting Professor at Golden Gate University, School of Law (California), Stetson University (Florida) and, more recently, the Institute of European Studies (Macao).

Dr. Gromek-Broc was, most recently, a discussant for the session on “Gender Mainstreaming in the CEE Countries”, *ECPR Second Pan-European Conference on EU Politics*, The John Hopkins University, Bologna, Italy, 24-26 June 2004; and “Positive Action/Affirmative Action—US-EU Comparative Study”, *Society of Legal Scholars (SLS) Conference*, University of Sheffield, UK, 13-15 September 2004.

*Roemer Lemaître* is a Research Fellow of the Fund for Scientific Research Flanders (FWO) at the Institute for International Law at the Catholic University of Leuven (Belgium); he is currently preparing his doctoral dissertation on the role of international law in strengthening the rule of law in Russia. His other research interests include human rights, constitutional law, and legal theory.

Mr. Lemaître has studied law and philosophy in Leuven and—in 2000—has obtained an LL.M. degree from Columbia University (New York City). Between 2000 and 2002, he studied law and international relations at Moscow and Saint-Petersburg State Universities. He has also interned with Human Rights Watch (New York and Moscow).

In addition, Mr. Lemaître has published on Chechnya, Belgium’s universal jurisdiction legislation, and the European Court of Human Rights. At a seminar in Moscow in 2005, he presented a paper on closed cities in Russia (ZATOs) and their compatibility with human rights standards.
